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### Teen artist creates space for awareness, understanding

Kids for Camp teen volunteer, Pensacola High IB senior, big sister, and talented artist, are just a few ways to describe BethAnne Parra. And now she can add art show curator to her list of titles. BethAnne,

in partnership with Mainline Art House, will present Art Across the Spectrum, a show featuring art inspired by autism and benefitting Autism Pensacola. The art show will run from Oct. 14th through Oct. 24th, at the gallery located at 422 S. Palafox St., in downtown Pensacola. The show will also be featured as part of downtown Pensacola's Gallery Night, Oct. 17th from 5 to 9 p.m.

BethAnne began her involvement with API several years ago when her younger

brother, Matthew, attended Kids for Camp.In the fall of 2013, BethAnne decided to do her Community-Action-Service (CAS) project with Autism Pensacola. As part of the IB program, each student must complete an original CAS project. An artist, BethAnne wanted to incorporate her talent and her knowledge of Kids for Camp into her project.

So, she began painting 50 individual puzzle pieces inspired by past Kids for Camp campers. The puzzle pieces were used this spring at API's Connecting the Pieces gala as thank-you gifts for donors who "raised their paddle" to send a child to camp.

BethAnne then decided to reach further across the spectrum for Phase 2 of her project and began the process of curating an art show. Thanks to the generosity of Mikel Traffanstead at Mainline Art House, Art Across the Spectrum was born. Art from local artists, such

API provided another great Kids for Camp Summer Learning Lab, as well as supported inclusion opportunities at the YMCA and UWF. Special Olympics offered several sporting activities, including softball, surfing, swimming, and stand-up paddleboard, to name a few. Our loved ones could swim at SeaStars, play baseball with

Miracle League, or ride a horse at Leaning Post Ranch. From the longstanding programs to the many exciting new opportunities, our community worked hard to show understanding and acceptance.

The newcomer that made a big splash was Autism Surfs. This group of dedicated volunteers could be found every weekend somewhere along the Gulf Coast—from Panama City to Pensacola Beach -- welcoming and supporting those with autism (and other disabilities) as they explored the fun of catching a wave. Dedicated volunteers would respond to the call each weekend, no matter how far they had to travel. Scores of families came out to enjoy the surf, the sun, and the acceptance. Captains for Kids is the brainchild of Captain Steve Potate of Orange Beach, AL. Last September, he had the idea to have a day on the water for families with special needs – entirely free for the entire family! This year, their second annual event, 18 boat captains and their crews made 49 trips filled with more than 600 people for fishing, parasailing, and dolphin cruising! More than 70 volunteers worked tirelessly to make it all possible. What a testimony to the kindness and caring of this area! Families traveled from all over Alabama and west Florida to participate. Next year -- the sky's the limit!



As I write this, the Gulf Breeze Masonic Lodge #347 has announced its second Sea No Limits Fishing Clinic on October 12 at the Palafox Pier in Pensacola. This amazing day is open to special needs individuals (of all ages!). There is free food, free fishing poles, and lots of volunteers helping everyone have a good time. # **Sleep Issues and Autism**

Sleep issues are a very common problem that span all ages in persons with autism. When children do not receive a proper night's sleep, then parents do not get much sleep either. This basic necessity is fundamental for healthy psychological function.

Dr. David M. Suhrbier, D.O.,will lead a panel discussion with Sacred Heart Autism Center's Debbie Keremes, BCBA, and Kerry Sise, LMHC, addressing sleep issues associated with the autistic child at API's annual meeting. Topics will include the importance of sleep, the effects of inadequate sleep on the body, short-term Cognitive Behavioral Therapy, sleep hygiene, relaxation techniques, coping tools, and common behavioral sleep problems.



## Book Review: I Might Be You - An Exploration of Autism and Connection

Facilitated Communication (FC) is one of the scores of treatments and techniques for autism that have appeared over the past several decades. Like many others, it brought hope, then controversy, then faded away- for the most part. But with the continuing improvements in technology, more and more autistic people are finding a way to share their voice.

Barb Rentenbach is one such person. In her book, I Might Be You: An Exploration of Autism and Connection, Barb and her therapist, Lois Prislovsky, share an amazing view of the world -- a view inside the mind of a non-verbal autistic woman.

Not only does this book show that FC can be the answer to communicating for some with autism, it reveals an amazing, insightful mind that is funny, philosophical, and inspiring. Barb's discussion of being a contemplative in an active world has much to teach us all. Her ability to see all people as "flecks of God" reveals the depth of her thinking. I looked over many comments about this book. There is so much in it; it truly should be required reading for anyone working with autistic people who have not yet found a way to share their voice.

Barb and Lois alternate chapters in the book, which took 10 years to write. It opens with these lines: "Did you hear the severe autism alert sirens wailing? Did that storm luckily miss you and yours? Not us. Our family took a direct hit. I Might Be You is a fresh look at the damage and emerging sun as told by an adult with autism who 'is disguised as a poor thinker' but has much to say yet

does not speak and a therapist who helps rebuild."

Barb refers to her mom as "smother," as might any young adult who has not had children of her own! Her mom shares about the book and her pride in all Barb has become, "This book is for anyone who has a disabled relative, friend or acquaintance. It has tremendous

insight and is wonderfully funny ... It is a testament to what anyone can achieve no matter the hardships. Being unable to talk is one of the worst handicaps (along with the autism), and Barb has triumphed in this regard." I can't say it any better than the person who introduced me to this book, Jess Wilson of A Diary of a Mom blog. She says,

"This book changed me.I cannot recommend this book strongly enough. Please don't be fooled — it is not just a book for those whose lives are touched directly by autism. No, it's a book for anyone who has ever sought connection — with themselves, with their fellow human beings, with the world around them, with God.

It is not remotely an exaggeration to say that this book has changed me. It has made me a better mother, a better advocate for my autistic daughter, and, above all, a better person. I want to be Barb when I grow up. Read the book. It's a gift."

What she said: Read the book. And compel everyone you know to read the book.
