Kids for Camp honors our Hometown Heroes

Teen and young adult campers at Kids for Camp honored local first responders at an invitation-only luncheon for Hometown Heroes. Professionals from law enforcement, emergency medical services, fire departments, military, and search and rescue groups attended the event and then toured camp.

Representatives from area first responders included Chief Deputy Chip Simmons from the Escambia County Sheriff's Office and Pensacola Police Chief Tommi Lyter. The professionals

Creating a Summer of Learning and Fun

Water days, trampolines, rock painting, and dancing - these are just some of the things that made Kids for Camp 2017 a summer to remember. This year, we welcomed 79 campers to participate in the 5-week summer learning lab, along with 52 staff members and 70 teen peers.

Across the surveys, feedback from both parents and staff has been very positive. Parents reported their camper was safe, making progress, and having fun. Teachers reported they gained valuable skills that could be carried back into the classroom.

Camp was created to bridge the gap between school years. We focus on skill acquisition for each camper and intern and provide a unique place to develop social skills and create friendships.

Through community field trips and on-campus activities, kids

Sailing with Satori

In January 2016, the Satori Foundation, a local sailing organization, reached out to Autism Pensacola to connect and get individuals with autism sailing. API, in its partnerships with local resources, connected Satori to local FSU-CARD consultant Dr. Chrissy Ogilvie.

Based out of the Pensacola Yacht Club, the Satori Foundation focuses on bringing individuals with special needs and at-risk youth on weekly sails. Dr. Ogilvie has provided the foundation with consul-

tations and ongoing training for the captains and crew on how to best support those with ASD. She also attends each sail to further support the captains and crew. Since the partnership was formed, there have been 14 sailing trips that included autism families.


Dr. Ogilvie is now serving on the Satori Advisory Board, and her latest initiative presented to the Foundation is a teach-the-teacher sail day. The initiative will bring 15 education professionals to the Satori for a class on incorporating both sailing and STEM concepts into the classroom. The teachers will also get to enjoy a day on the water with Satori and be provided with lesson plans and props for their classrooms. Autism Pensacola is so grateful to the Satori Foundation and Dr. Ogilvie for bringing these opportunities to our community.

Inclusion at the NFA

At the end of last year, Autism Pensacola was approached by representatives from the National Flight Academy at Pensacola Naval Air Station. The group was expanding its reach into the community and looking for ways to include autistic individuals in their summer programs. The NFA had received funding to provide scholarships for these individuals to be able to participate.

API connected the NFA with Dr. Chrissy Ogilvie and a partnership has been formed to provide training and collaboration. Through the partnership, CARD and the NFA have worked to develop curriculum, and accommodations and modifications for including more individuals with autism.

In summer 2017, the NFA funded 12 students with ASD to attend a 5-day "deployment" (summer camp). Dr. Ogilvie observed the participants weekly and was available for on-the-spot consultation. In early July, she started working to develop 1-day "adventures" for individuals with ASD who are less conversational and that demonstrate the need for a modified environment. CARD is currently working to develop the curriculum, schedule, and activities. NFA is funding 36 5th-12th graders to attend 1-day adventures at the National Flight Academy this fall.

Safety Programs

Project Lifesaver is a program offered by Autism Pensacola, Inc., in partnership with Escambia Search and Rescue and the Pilot Club of Pensacola to individuals with any developmental disability who are at risk of wandering. The program features transmitter bracelets that emit a radio signal that search and rescue personnel can use to track and locate an individual who is missing.

COST: Bracelet available free of charge, depending on funds. Monthly maintenance fee of \$30 that covers cost of batteries and transmitter bands for the device. Financial assistance available based on income.

This program is available in both Escambia and Santa Rosa counties.

Take Me Home is a free program provided by the Pensacola Police Department that manages a database of

information on individuals with special needs, developmental or cognitive disability who may need assistance if they are found alone or have difficulty communicating.

The database includes a picture, disability information, physical description and emergency contact information for all registered individuals. If a person in the Take Me Home program is encountered alone by a police officer or is reported missing, the officer can access the database by the person’s name or physical description to locate their information. This is a free service offered to developmentally and cognitively disabled citizens in the Pensacola area.
